	The Supreme Court defined ragging in the Vishwa Jagriti matter (1999) as, "Any disorderly conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness any other student, indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student or asking the students to do any act or perform something which such student will not in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student." (Raghavan Committee Report, 2007, para. 3.19).
Details	The anti-ragging campaign got an impetus in 1999 when the Hon'ble Supreme Court, in response to a PIL filed by the Vishwa Jagriti Mission, asked the University Grants Commission (UGC) to issue guidelines to universities to curb ragging. All Higher Educational Institutions are mandated to set up Anti Ragging Cells along with CASH and HRPC.
	In this regard, an orientation was organized for the fresh batch of students during their induction program. A presentation highlighting the definition of ragging and its consequences was presented to reiterate the fact that it's a punishable offence. After the orientation, the coordinator collected a signed undertaking from all the students about not indulging in ragging on campus and if so, about the consequences.

Detailed Report	Guest Lecture on "STAND UP, SPEAK OUT, STOP RAGGING" – The programme commenced with demonstrating videos about the consequences and violation of rules and regulations related to Traffic. The programme continued with the welcome speech and Resource person was introduced by Ms. Reshma, V Sem B. Com FGCW student. After the introduction, Ashold Sir started giving lecture about the Ragging and its repercussions through PowerPoint presentation with videos and explained about Ragging and its consequences. Ragging is a rampant practice in colleges, hostels and sometimes even in high schools. Seniors, in the form of ragging, demoralize and defame the juniors. Ragging can be in the form of physical and verbal abuse. It also gives a sense of superiority to the seniors who rag their juniors. It is a disturbing reality and a disorderly

conduct. Perpetuating factors for ragging include substance abuse, especially in the hostels, lack of implementation of strict anti-ragging measures in educational institutions.

It can be in the form of teasing or handling the students with rudeness often creating fear and apprehension in the victims. The victims suffer in the form of depression, demoralization, isolation, and other detrimental effects on their personality. Sometimes feeling depressed can lead them to even commit suicide. Ragging causes physical, emotional, and behavioural effects on students and creates negative feelings in them. It is a public health problem as it involves physical, mental, and social exploitation. It not only affects the individuals, but also their family and in turn the whole society. The programme ended up with question and answers and the doubts were clarified regarding effects of ragging and rules and regulations to be followed toward traffic.
